**CONSENT ORDER APPOINTING THE FLORIDA DEPARTMENT OF
INSURANCE AS RECEIVER FOR PURPOSES OF LIQUIDATION,
INJUNCTION, AND NOTICE OF AUTOMATIC STAY**

THIS CAUSE was considered on the Petition of the Florida Department of Insurance for a consent order of liquidation of FIRST ALLIANCE INSURANCE COMPANY. The Court having reviewed the pleadings of record, having heard presentation of counsel, and otherwise being fully informed in the premises, finds:

1. FIRST ALLIANCE INSURANCE COMPANY (hereafter "Respondent") is a Florida corporation and is a domestic insurer authorized to transact an insurance business in the State of Florida.

2. Section 631.021(3), Florida Statutes (1993), provides that a delinquency proceeding pursuant to Chapter 631, Florida Statutes, constitutes the sole and exclusive method of liquidating, rehabilitating, reorganizing, or conserving an insurer.

3. Section 631.061, Florida Statutes (1993), authorizes the Department to apply to this Court for an order directing it to liquidate a domestic insurer upon the existence of any of the grounds specified in Section 631.061 or 631.051, Florida Statutes (1993), or if such insurer is or is about to become insolvent.

4. Section 631.061, Florida Statutes (1993), and Section 631.051(11), Florida Statutes (1993), authorize the Department to apply to this Court for an order directing it to liquidate a domestic insurer upon the ground that the insurer has consented to such an order through a majority of its directors, stockholders, members, or subscribers.

5. Respondent has consented to the appointment of the Department as Receiver for purposes of liquidation and does not contest the issue that Respondent is insolvent as defined under Chapter 631, Florida Statutes (1993).

6. Respondent has been found by the department to be in such condition or using such methods or practices in the conduct of its business as to render the further *transaction of insurance presently or prospectively hazardous* to its subscribers, policyholders, creditors and the public.

7. Respondent's affiliate, First Premium Finance Corporation, has not consented that it is an alter ego of Respondent and should be considered a part of Respondent for liquidation. Therefore that part of the order to show cause rendered by this Court and directed to First Premium Finance Corporation shall remain in full force and effect pending the hearing scheduled on that order.

8. It is in the best interests of Respondent and its creditors and insureds that the relief requested in the petition be granted as to *First Alliance Insurance Company*.

IT IS THEREFORE ORDERED and ADJUDGED as follows:

9. Department of Insurance of the State of Florida is hereby appointed Receiver of Respondent for purposes of liquidation and the said Receiver is authorized and directed to:
10. Take immediate possession of all the property, assets, and estate, and all other property of every kind whatsoever and wherever located belonging to Respondent pursuant to Sections 631.111 and 631.141, Florida Statutes (1993), including but not limited to, offices maintained by the Respondent, rights of action, books, papers, evidences of debt, bonds, debentures and other securities, mortgages, furniture, fixtures, office supplies and equipment, bank accounts, stocks, bonds, debentures, mortgages, furniture, fixtures, and office equipment, and all real property of Respondent, whether in the possession of Respondent or its officers, directors, employees, consultants, attorneys, or agents.
11. Liquidate the assets of Respondent including but not limited to funds held by Respondent's agents, subagents, producing agents, brokers, solicitors, service representatives or others under agency contracts or otherwise which are due and unpaid to Respondent, including premiums, unearned commissions, agents' balances, agents' reserve funds, and subrogation recoveries.
12. Employ and authorize the compensation of legal counsel, accountants, clerks, and such assistants as it deems necessary, purchase or lease

personal or real property as it deems necessary and authorize the payment of the expenses of these proceedings and the necessary incidents thereof, as approved by the Court, to be paid out of the funds or assets of the Respondent in the possession of the Receiver or coming into its possession.

13. Reimburse such employees, from the funds of this receivership, for their actual necessary and reasonable expenses incurred while traveling on the business of this receivership.
14. Not defend or accept service of process on legal actions wherein the Respondent or the Receiver is a party defendant, commenced either prior to or subsequent to this order, without authorization of this Court; except, however, in actions where Respondent is a nominal party, as in certain foreclosure actions and the action does not effect a claim against or adversely affect the assets of Respondent, the Receiver may file appropriate pleadings in its discretion.
15. Commence and maintain all legal actions necessary, wherever necessary, for the proper administration of this receivership proceeding.
16. Collect all debts which are economically feasible to collect which are due and owing to the Respondent.
17. Take possession of all of Respondent's securities and certificates of deposit on deposit with the Treasurer of Florida, if any, and convert to cash as much as may be necessary, in its judgment, to pay the expenses of

administration of this receivership.

18. Publish notice specifying the time and place fixed for the filing of claims with the Receiver once each week for three consecutive weeks in the Florida Administrative Weekly published by the Secretary of State, and at least once in the Florida Bar News.
19. Negotiate and settle subrogation claims and Final Judgments up to and including the sum of Twenty Thousand Dollars (\$20,000.00) without further order of this Court.
20. Sell any salvage recovered having value of not more than Twenty Thousand Dollars (\$20,000.00) without further order of this Court.
21. Coordinate the operation of the receivership with the Florida Insurance Guaranty Association pursuant to Part II of Chapter 631, Florida Statutes (1991). The Receiver may, in its discretion, contract with the guaranty association to provide services as are necessary to carry out the purposes of Chapter 631.
22. Give notice of this proceeding to Respondent's agents pursuant to Section 631.341, Florida Statutes (1991), and to its insureds, if any.

IT IS FURTHER ORDERED and **ADJUDGED** that:

23. All officers, directors, agents and employees and all other persons representing Respondent or currently employed by Respondent in connection with the conduct of its business are discharged forthwith.
24. Title to all property real or personal, all contracts, rights of action and all

books and records of Respondent, wherever located, are vested in the Receiver pursuant to Sections 631.111 and 631.141, Florida Statutes (1993).

25. Any officer, director, manager, trustee, attorney, agent, accountant, actuary, broker, employee or adjuster of Respondent and any other person who possesses or possessed any executive authority over, or who exercises or exercised any control over any segment of Respondent's affairs shall fully cooperate with the Receiver, pursuant to Section 631.391, Florida Statutes (1993), notwithstanding paragraph 23 of this order.
26. All attorneys employed by Respondent as of this date shall, within 10 days notice of this Order, report to the Receiver on the name, company claim number and status of each file they are handling on behalf of the Respondent. Said report shall also include an accounting of any funds received from or on behalf of the Respondent. All attorneys employed by Respondent are hereby discharged as of the date of this Order unless their services are retained by the Receiver. All attorneys employed by Respondent are hereby advised that pursuant to Section 631.011 (17), Florida Statutes, a claim based on mere possession does not create a secured claim and all attorneys employed by Respondent, pursuant to In Re the Receivership of Syndicate Two, Inc., 538 So.2d 945 (Fla. 1st DCA 1989), who are in possession of litigation files or other material, documents or records belonging to or relating to work performed by the attorney on

behalf of Respondent shall deliver such litigation files, material, documents or records intact and without purging to the Receiver, on request, notwithstanding any claim of a retaining lien which, if otherwise valid, shall not be extinguished by the delivery of these documents.

27. All agents, brokers or other persons having sold policies of insurance and/or collected premiums on behalf of the Respondent shall account for and pay all premiums and commissions unearned due to cancellation of policies by this Order or in the normal course of business owed to the Respondent directly to the Receiver within 30 days of demand by the Receiver or appear before this Court to show cause, if any they may have, as to why they should not be required to account to the Receiver or be held in contempt of Court for violation of the provisions of this Order. No agent, broker, premium finance company or other person shall use premium monies owed to the Respondent for refund of unearned premium or for any purpose other than payment to the Receiver.
28. Any premium finance company, including but not limited to First Premium Finance Corporation, which has entered into a contract to finance a premium for a policy which has been issued by the Respondent shall pay any premium owed to the Respondent directly to the Receiver. First Premium Finance Corporation, being an affiliate company which acted as a premium finance company for Respondent, shall immediately account and turn over all funds in its possession or control which it owes to Respondent

and make all of its books and records available to the Receiver.

29. Reinsurance premiums due to or payable by the Respondent shall be remitted to, or disbursed by, the Receiver. Reinsurance losses recoverable or payable by the Respondent shall be handled by the Receiver. All correspondence concerning reinsurance shall be between the Receiver and the reinsuring company or intermediary.
30. Upon request by the Receiver, any company providing telephonic services to the Respondent shall provide a reference of calls from the number presently assigned to the Respondent to any such number designated by the Receiver or perform any other services or changes necessary to the conduct of the receivership.
31. Any bank, savings and loan association, financial institution or other person, including but not limited to **Capital Bank, 1221 Brickell Avenue, Miami, FL; accounts #0750003944 and #0750003936; Sun Bank of Miami, 3737 nw 87th Ave. Miami, FL; accounts #0542001010398 and #0542001012180; Barnett Bank, 150 West Flagler Street, Miami, FL; account #1596110262; Smith Barney, 701 Brickell Avenue, Miami, FL; accounts #395-072747-16-038 and First Union National Bank of Florida Account # 4056210763 (statutory deposit)**, and any other bank, savings and loan association or other financial institution which has on deposit, in its possession, custody or control any funds, accounts and any other assets of the Respondent, shall immediately transfer title, custody and control of all such funds,

accounts, or assets to the Receiver, and are hereby instructed that the Receiver has absolute control over such funds, accounts and other assets. The Receiver may change the name of such accounts and other assets, withdraw them from such bank, savings and loan association or other financial institution, change signature cards or take any lesser action necessary for the proper conduct of this receivership. No bank, savings and loan association or other financial institution shall exercise any form of set-off, alleged set-off, lien, any form of self-help whatsoever, or refuse to transfer any funds or assets to the Receiver's control or follow the Receiver's direction concerning those accounts without the permission of this Court.

32. Any entity furnishing telephone, water, electric, sewage, garbage or trash removal services to the Respondent shall maintain such service and transfer any such accounts to the Receiver as of the date of this order, unless instructed to the contrary by the Receiver.
33. Any data processing service which has custody or control of any data processing information and records including but not limited to source documents, data processing cards, input tapes, all types of storage information, master tapes or any other recorded information relating to the Respondent shall transfer custody and control of such records to the Receiver. The Receiver shall compensate any such entity for the actual use of hardware and software which the Receiver finds to be necessary to

this proceeding. Compensation shall be based upon the monthly rate provided for in contracts or leases with Respondent which were in effect when this proceeding was instituted, or based upon such contract as may be negotiated by the Receiver, for the actual time such equipment and software is used by the Receiver.

34. The United States Postal Service is directed to provide any information requested by the Receiver regarding the Respondent and to handle future deliveries of Respondent's mail as directed by the Receiver.
35. All claims shall be filed with the Receiver on or before 12:01 a.m. March 12, 1996 or be forever barred, and all such claims should be filed on proof of claim forms prepared by the Receiver.
36. Pursuant to the provisions of Section 631.252, Florida Statutes (1993), other than policies covered by Part III of Chapter 631, Florida Statutes (1993), all insurance policies, bonds or similar contracts of coverage of the Respondent issued in Florida and now in force shall continue in force until 30 days from the date of the entry of this Order of Liquidation and shall be determined canceled as of 12:01 a.m. June 11, 1995; except that those policies or contracts of coverage with normal expiration dates prior thereto and policies terminated by insureds or lawfully canceled by the insurer before such date, shall stand canceled as of such earlier date.
37. Except for contracts of insurance, all executory contracts to which the Respondent was a party are hereby canceled and will stand canceled

unless specifically adopted by the Receiver within 30 days of the date of this Order. The rights of the parties to any such contracts are fixed as of the date of this Order and any cancellation under this provision shall not be treated as an anticipatory breach of such contracts.

38. All affiliated companies including, but limited to, First Premium Finance Corporation, are hereby directed to make their books and records available to the Receiver, to include all records located in any premises occupied by said affiliate, whether corporate records or not, and to provide copies of any records requested by the Receiver whether or not such records are related to Respondent. The Receiver has title to all policy files and other records of, and relating to Respondent, whether such documents are kept in offices occupied by an affiliate company or any other person or corporation. The Receiver is authorized to take possession of any such records, files, documents, and to remove them to any location in the Receiver's discretion. Any disputed records shall not be withheld from the Receiver's review, but shall be safeguarded and presented to this Court for review prior to copying by the Receiver.
39. The Receiver shall have complete access to all computer records of the Respondent and its affiliates at all times.
40. Any person, firm, corporation or other entity having notice of this order that fails to abide by its terms shall be directed to appear before this Court to show good cause, if any they may have, as to why they should not be held

in contempt of Court for violation of the provisions of this Order.

41. The Florida Department of Insurance is hereby authorized to cancel and render null and void any certificate of authority issued by the Department of Insurance and required by the Florida Insurance Code in order for Respondent to do business in the State of Florida.
42. Pursuant to Sections 631.041(3) and (4), Florida Statutes (1993), all persons, firms, corporations and associations within the jurisdiction of this Court, including, but not limited to, Respondent and its officers, directors, stockholders, members, subscribers, agents, and employees, are enjoined and restrained from the further transaction of the insurance business of the Respondent; from doing, doing through omission, or permitting to be done any action which might waste or dispose of the books, records and assets of the Respondent; from in any means interfering with the Receiver or these proceedings; from the transfer of property and assets of Respondent without the consent of the Receiver; from the removal, concealment, or other disposition of Respondent's property, books, records, and accounts; from the commencement or prosecution of any actions against the Respondent or the Receiver together with its agents or employees, the service of process and subpoenas, or the obtaining of preferences, judgments, writs of attachment or garnishment or other liens; and from the making of any levy or execution against Respondent or any of its property or assets.

CONTINUATION OF INVESTIGATION

43. The Receiver may continue with its investigation authorized by Section 631.391, Florida Statutes (1993) of Respondent and its affiliates, as defined above, including but not limited to the First Premium Finance Corporation, to uncover and make fully available to the Court the true state of Respondent's financial affairs. In furtherance of this investigation, Respondent and its parent corporations, its subsidiaries, affiliates including but not limited to the Respondent's affiliates as set out above, shall continue make all books, documents, accounts, records, and affairs, which either belong to or pertain to the Respondent, available for full, free and unhindered inspection and examination by the Receiver during normal business hours (9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m.) Monday through Friday, from the date of this Order. This investigation shall include a full and complete examination of any and all reviews, compilations, audits or any other work of whatever nature performed by the accounting firm of Benitez and Figueras, to include all workpapers, on behalf of, related to or in any way connected with Respondent, its affiliates and/or entities comprising Respondent's Holding Company System or Respondent's corporate structure and affiliations. The Respondent and the above specified entities shall cooperate with the Receiver to the fullest extent required by Section 631.391, Florida Statutes (1993). Such cooperation shall include, but is not

limited to, the taking of oral testimony under oath of Respondent's officers, directors, managers, trustees, agents, adjusters, employees, or independent contractor of Respondent its affiliates and any other person who possesses any executive authority over, or who exercises any control over, any segment of the affairs of Respondent in both their official, representative and individual capacities and the production of all documents that are calculated to disclose the true state of Respondent's affairs.

44. Any officer, director, manager, trustee, agent, accountants, adjuster, employee, or independent contractor of Respondent and any other person who possesses any executive authority over, or who exercises any control over, any segment of the affairs of Respondent shall fully cooperate with the Receiver as required by Section 631.391, Florida Statutes (1993), and as set out in the preceding paragraph. Upon receipt of a certified copy of this Order, any bank or financial institution shall immediately disclose to the Receiver the existence of any accounts of Respondent and any funds contained therein and any and all documents in its possession relating to Respondent for the Receiver's inspection and copying, including but not limited to all records, statements, and information regarding the following accounts: First Union National Bank, accounts #2090000502147, #2090000502134, and #2079900146352, 950 S.W. 57th Avenue, Miami, FL; 1825 N.W. 79th Avenue, Miami, FL; and 8324 Baymeadows Way, Jacksonville, FL (First Premium Finance Corp.); Capital Bank, 71 East

Brickell Avenue, Miami, FL; accounts #0750003944 and #0750003936 (First Alliance Insurance Company); Sun Bank of Miami, 777 Brickell Avenue, Miami, FL; accounts #0542001010398 and #0542001012180 (First Alliance Insurance Company); Barnett Bank, 150 West Flagler Street, Miami, FL; account #1596110262 (First Alliance Insurance Company); Smith Barney, 701 Brickell Avenue, Miami, FL; accounts #395-072747-16-038 and #395-07429-10-038 (First Alliance Insurance Company); Total Bank, Miami, FL, 33145, account #40015615906 (Balmoral); Republic National Bank, 10 N.W. 42nd Avenue, Miami, FL, account #0011242222 (Larrauri).

NOTICE OF AUTOMATIC STAY

45. Notice is hereby given that, pursuant to Section 631.041(1), Florida Statutes (1993), the filing of the Department's initial petition herein operates as an automatic stay applicable to all persons and entities, other than the Receiver, which shall be permanent and survive the entry of this order, and which prohibits:
46. The commencement or continuation of judicial, administrative or other action or proceeding against the insurer or against its assets or any part thereof;
 - A. The enforcement of a judgment against the insurer or an affiliate obtained either before or after the commencement of the delinquency

proceeding;

- B. Any act to obtain possession of property of the insurer;
 - C. Any act to create, perfect or enforce a lien against property of the insurer, except a secured claim as defined in Section 631.011(17), Florida Statutes (1993);
 - D. Any action to collect, assess or recover a claim against the insurer, except claims as provided for under Chapter 631;
 - E. The set-off or offset of any debt owing to the insurer except offsets as provided in Section 631.281, Florida Statutes (1993).
47. All Sheriffs and all law enforcement officials of this state shall cooperate with and assist the Receiver in the implementation of this Order.
48. This Court retains jurisdiction of this cause for the purpose of granting such other and further relief as from time to time shall be deemed appropriate.
