On Wednesday, I <u>addressed</u> the Enterprise Florida, Inc.'s (EFI) June board meeting and praised Governor DeSantis' decision to end enhanced jobless benefits and criticized the Biden Administration for incentivizing individuals not to go back to work. If you feel you have become the victim of an app scam, delete the app immediately and monitor your financial accounts closely for any fraudulent charges.
