

### Florida Statute Chapter 252



Florida State Chapter 252, or commonly known as the "State Emergency Management Act," authorizes the creation of a state emergency management agency to be known as the "Division of Emergency Management."

The Division is charged with implementing programs whose goals are to avoid or reduce the impacts of natural and man made disasters.





## Comprehensive Emergency Management Plan (CEMP)



- Sets the "Overall Framework"
- Provides guidance to state and local officials on procedures, organization and responsibilities
- Adopts a functional approach that combines the types of assistance to be provided under each Emergency Support Function (e.g., Transportation, Health)



- Grouped by Emergency Support Function.
- 18 Emergency Support Functions (ESFs).
- Emergency Coordinating Officers (ECO).

#### • Level 3 Monitoring

 Routine monitoring and SERT Situational Awareness through the 24-hour State Watch Office

#### • Level 2 Activation

 Selected ESF's notified and staffing the SEOC based on the nature of the event.


#### Level 1 Activation

 All ESF's present and staffing the SEOC, 24-hour operation as needed.



## State Logistics Response Center

- 200,000 sq ft warehouse in Orlando.
- Used to store commodities needed for disaster response.
- 20,000 sq ft of office space.
- Can accommodate 120 tractor trailers.
- Helicopter Landing Zone.
- Emergency back-up generator.

State and Federal officials should be ready to provide support and resources when local agencies are overwhelmed.






# State of Florida Initial Response


Incident Occurs or a Threat is Present

- 1. Establish Communication with Areas Impacted
- 2. Search and Rescue /Security
- 3. Meet Basic Human Needs
  - 1. Medical
  - 2. Water
  - 3. Food
  - 4. Shelter
  - 5. Emergency Fuel
  - 6. Ice is a distant sixth
    (Unless its really hot)



- 5. Open Schools / Local Businesses
- 6. Begin the Recovery
